To Whom It May Concern,

Following are the Wyoming Department of Agriculture (WDA) comments regarding the Proposed Rule establishing a nonessential experimental population (NEP) of the gray wolf in the State of Colorado.

Our comments are specific to our mission: dedication to the promotion and enhancement of Wyoming's agriculture, natural resources and quality of life. As the proposed project could affect our industry, citizens, and natural resources it is important that you continue to inform us of proposed actions and decisions and continue to provide the opportunity to communicate pertinent issues and concerns.

The State of Wyoming manages gray wolves as either trophy game animals or predatory animals. The predator management area extends the entire length of our shared border with the State of Colorado. As mentioned in the proposed rule, any NEP gray wolf from Colorado, which migrates north into Wyoming will fall under our existing management as predatory animal status. This year-round status does not require a license, and allows the lethal removal of any wolf on all lands, excluding the Wind River Indian Reservation. The predatory animal status is critical for Wyoming livestock producers to protect their animals from wolf depredation.

We respectfully request the USFWS ensure this information is embedded into the Final Rule and Final Record of Decision. Additionally, we believe the USFWS agency and respective decision documents provide assurances the NEP wolves from Colorado do not get additional protection as a sensitive species under other federal agencies, such as the Bureau of Land Management or the US Forest Service.

As an example, the Medicine Bow and Routt National Forests are contiguous landscapes between Wyoming and Colorado. WDA strongly opposes the NEP gray wolf status on the Routt National Forest having the same status or protection for persistence and viability as a sensitive species on the Medicine Bow National Forest. WDA suggests considering memorializing this into Memorandums of Understanding or some other agreed upon legal document prior to the release of any gray wolves into the State of Colorado.
